


Crocodile's Crossing: A Search for Home


Crocodile's Crossing: A Search for Home

Four Feet, Two Sandals




Four Feet, Two Sandals - written by Karen Lynn Williams and Khadra Mohammed and illustrated by Doug Chayka - is a picture book telling the story of Lina and Feroza, two girls living in a refugee camp in Pakistan. When relief workers bring used clothing to the camp, ten-year-old Lina is thrilled to find a sandal that fits her foot perfectly - until she sees that another girl has the matching shoe. But soon Lina and Feroza meet and decide that it is better to share the sandals than for each to wear only one. The girls discover the true meaning of friendship and sacrifice. "Four Feet, Two Sandals" honors the experiences of refugee children around the world, whose daily existence is marked by uncertainty and fear. Warm colors and bold brush strokes are the perfect complement to this story of courage and hope. Available at bookstores and online. There are also video readings of the book on YouTube.




From Far Away

From Far Away - written by Robert Munsch and Saoussan Askar and illustrated by Rebecca Green. When Saoussan immigrated with her family from war-torn Lebanon, she was only seven years old. This picture book tells the story of how she had to adjust to her new home in Canada. She describes the frustration of not understanding the teacher when she started school, not knowing how to ask to go to the bathroom and being terrified of a Halloween skeleton. This is the perfect book to help kids empathize with immigrant children whose experiences are very similar to Saoussan's. Available at bookstores and online.
