

# Aziscohos Lake

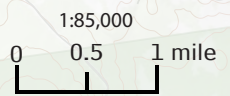
Aziscohos Lake is a fairly remote lake near the New Hampshire border. 16 mile long, the lake was formed in 1911 by damming the Magalloway River to generate power. Be aware that strong winds can funnel down the lake, creating whitecaps and choppy conditions. Check the forecast before your trip.

**SAMPLE**

- 1 (Mile 0) **Black Brook Cove Launch** is via a **boat ramp** managed by the Black Brook Cove Campground. The lake is impounded by the **Aziscohos Dam**. Constructed in 1911, concrete dam broken by horse team over Dixville Notch. At the time built, it was the largest dam in the world.
- 2 (Mile 1.5) **Beaver Island** sports a small island, and is a fine destination for day paddlers.
- 3 (Mile 7.2) **Lincoln Brook** is a good base for a day trip.
- 4 (Mile 10) **Lincoln Brook narrows** between the mountains. Listen for an echo on a calm day here.
- 5 (Mile 13) **The northern arm** is arguably the most beautiful spot on the lake, with mountains rise up dramatically to the north. The outlets to the Magalloway and Little Magalloway are worth exploring.
