The Importance of Hospice Care By Dr. Shrivastava, Hospice of San Joaquin Medical Director

Hospice care is specialized care that focuses on the quality of life for people with life- limiting illnesses. While people are in the last phase of an incurable disease, hospice providers are trained to deliver compassionate care to improve the quality of life for the remainder of time. Hospice care does not hasten or postpone death. Hospice care does not treat the disease but effectively treats the symptoms of the disease and the person. Hospice benefits are not limited to the person only, but it includes patients and their families and making decisions.

Hospice care is centered in the home or wherever patient lives including homeless individuals but allows receiving care at a specialized inpatient hospice unit, similar service delivered in the hospital or a nursing home either to manage symptoms or to give respite to the caregivers. Hospice care includes medical social worker services, spiritual care services and bereavement care.

There are many misconceptions amongst people at the healthcare providers. Hospice related misconceptions and myths require clarification, explanation and education so that people are not prevented from receiving the entitlement of the benefits that are due to them. That means hospice care is free! Let's dispel some of these myths...

#1. You have to pay for hospice care

Medicare and Medi-Cal hospice benefit is an entitlement and there is no cost. This is all inclusive basic medical service, physician and nursing service, visits to the patient wherever they are located, all hospice related medications and equipment. It also includes social services, special services, bereavement services, and assistant in homemaking services.

#2. Once you signed up you cannot get out of the hospice program

All it takes is to make a phone call or tell someone that you no longer want hospice services and want to return to curative care. Also, you can reenter the program anytime and any number of times if you meet the enrollment criteria for hospice care.

#3. There is an age criterion for hospice

While the majority of the people who receive hospice service are older, there is no age limit to receive the service. Hospice provides care to newborn babies, children and young adults, adults and elderly alike.

#4. People in hospice die faster

That is not true. Hospice care is designed only to improve quality of life and offers symptom management, emotional support and spiritual services by specially trained individuals.

#5. You must have only a few days to live to receive hospice care

No! That is not correct. There is no time limit to enroll in the hospice. However, due to the nature of the terminal disease, patient prognosis is generally 6 months or less. Number of people on the hospice service live longer than 6 months.

#6. You must have cancer to receive hospice care.

The truth is that patients with any terminal healthcare problem with a prognosis of 6 months or less can be enrolled in the hospice. It includes cancer, heart disease, different types of dementia, respiratory disease, kidney disease and stroke related complications.

#7. Your doctor must refer you to enroll in hospice care

You can call yourself, a family member, a friend, a healthcare provider, social worker, clergy or anyone can refer a patient to hospice.

#8. Hospice and palliative care are different names for the same service

There are many similarities between the 2 services in terms of pain control and symptom management 24 hours a day. However, major differences include the fact that on hospice you are no longer pursuing curative treatment like what you would do while on palliative care.

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#9. You will have to leave your home to be placed elsewhere if you sign up with hospice.

Hospice care is designed to be delivered at home or wherever you live. Temporary and short-term accommodation is available in inpatient units, in selected hospitals and nursing homes so you can receive more aggressive management of the symptoms until you return to your original location.

#10. Your family will not receive any benefits when you pass away.

Hospice benefit programs continue to provide bereavement and grief support services up to 1 year after the passing away of the patient. Consultations are available for many issues that happen after the patient passes away. This comes as a great help to the survivors as they may not be ready to deal with major changes that follow the passing of the patient.

Hospice of San Joaquin is a nonprofit organization that is supported by outstanding and well-trained hospice nursing staff, specializing medical social workers and chaplains, home health aides and hospice trained and board-certified medical staff. The services are available 24 hours a day to serve the community. Hospice of San Joaquin has been rated to be the best provider in San Joaquin County year after year. Hospice of San Joaquin is governed by a board of community members that guides the outstanding administrative officials to carry the mission forward. The medical director of hospice of San Joaquin and all the hospice physicians are available to answer any questions and assist with your plans as you and your family goes through the challenging times.

Parents of campers meet with our volunteer "Buddies" before the camp day to discuss individual children and their needs, so every child has individual support. Campers will learn they are not alone in their feelings of grief or their anxiety about the ways their lives have changed. This program is free and open to the public.
