SAVE ONE LIFE CELE

A little over twenty years ago, I stepped into the small and dusty two-room home of a family with hemophilia in Karachi, Pakistan, on the humid shores of the Arabian Sea. There, Save One Life was born. I saw their poverty, their need, their desperation. If only they had \$20 a month for school fees, their child with hemophilia would have a chance at life.

I vowed to help, and never looked back. Now, 20 years later, I can look back, and am grateful for the faith so many had in me and our team to accomplish what seemed at the time impossible: a one-to-one sponsorship program for children with bleeding disorders living in poverty. It has been the ultimate privilege to serve these families, and to meet them in their homes—sometimes a hut in rural Africa, sometimes a crammed one-room dwelling in an inner-city block, sometimes a maze-like slum—to share a meal, hear their story and find a way to help.

My job was to connect people to people: those with resources to help those without. And now, 20 years later, we have helped over 2,500 children. Our programs evolved to meet needs when we learned to listen with compassion, learned to see with our hearts, and then reached out to our global community. The families told us how to help, and we acted.

We've worked hard; so hard, that sometimes we forget to pause and see what we've accomplished. Living through the pandemic made for a difficult two years, but it was still the right time to celebrate life, and the lives we have changed.

Our 20th Anniversary Celebration on September 30, 2021 honored those who have contributed so much to our mission, and those who received our help. Participants were sent boxes of celebration items, so they could “raise a glass” with us. MC Michael Degrandpre, a well known personality and friend of the community, volunteered as host and kept the program moving smoothly, comically and productively. An astounding \$160,000 was donated during the two-hour event! Chris Bombardier and I shared our experiences overseas, Save One Life's origins, and we showed videos of our program partners, families overseas and sponsors and donors thanking us and pledging their support.

2021 HIGHLIGHTS

HAITI

Save One Life was the first nonprofit to establish a hemophilia program in Haiti, and is currently the only one. We continue to work with our partners at Coastal Haiti Mission to support young Haitians with hemophilia. In 2021, two children and one young adult in the north of the country receive one-to-one sponsorships; four young people in total all receive factor.

MICRO-ENTERPRISE GRANT PROGRAM

Micro-enterprise grants come in all shapes and sizes. Chetan (photo: right), from India, described his micro-enterprise grant as life changing. He dreamed of becoming a video editor but lacked a computer with the ability to complete professional looking projects. With his grant, Chetan purchased an Apple computer and has been consistently completing projects. He even edited a hit music video that has received over a million views!

PROJECT SHARE

Ken, from Kenya, was in a serious motorbike accident that injured his legs and caused bleeding in his brain. He was first transported to a hospital that was unfamiliar with treating bleeding disorders. The second hospital was familiar but lacked the factor needed to stop the bleeding. Our program partner donated factor sent by Project SHARE. Thankfully, Ken is now on the road to recovery! He took the time to send this note: “I want to thank Save One Life for coming to my rescue when I needed it the most. Thank you for providing me with factor VIII, which has made me OK. May almighty God bless you every day for your good work.”

SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENT SPOTLIGHT

In 2021, David Salomón Cárcamo Bonilla, from Honduras, completed his degree in microbiology and immediately helped his community during the pandemic. He shared his thanks for helping him achieve his dreams:

“Thank you for three years of consecutive support in my studies. From 2017 to 2019 I benefited from the scholarship program. During those years, it covered expenses that otherwise would have been difficult for my family to manage.

“Your support helped me to achieve my goals. Last year, I earned my degree in microbiology with honors. At the same time, I was employed as a health care worker in my native town. Currently I have just completed a year, helping my country, my community and my family.

“Every time I use my lab coat I remember your support and I just hope that in the same way that I was blessed with this program, many other people can also reach their goals.”

Kids Will Be Kids

Francis and Dan, ages 10 and 8, from Nairobi, Kenya both have hemophilia A. Their mom, Lydia, spends most of her time with them when they are not in school. While we conversed in her living room, her attention was partially directed toward what the kids are up to outside the house. This seems to be the pattern for hemophilia moms the world over.

During the pandemic, the government of Kenya enforced a national lock-down with a curfew for residents in Nairobi and other major towns. Parents struggled to make ends meet. The boys' father, Geoffrey, is the breadwinner. He is a musical artist and earns most of his income playing at events.

But gigs were hard to come by. The Save One Life sponsorship helped put food on the table and to live through it until work started coming in again.

Lydia will apply for a micro-enterprise grant to start a business and increase their household income. She is a part of women's groups and believes with their support and that of her husband she can create a sustainable income through her own business.

Kids with hemophilia tend to be shielded and restricted from the most vital part of any childhood—play. But boys will be boys. Access to factor through Save One Life's Project SHARE has allowed them to be boys again. These two, however, are sure to play safely with each other as they both know what it means to deal with a bleed. Lydia says that having each other as playmates has helped a great deal in coping with the condition, and she has gained confidence to let them play together.

Wheels for the World, our cycling fundraiser founded by the late Barry Haarde, continued to bring awareness to Save One Life and raise desperately needed funding for our programs.

In 2021, we resumed the virtual model but included several in-person events that allowed participants to ride together for the first time in two years. We held the first New England Hemophilia Association Day ride in Providence, Rhode Island. This is the first time Save One Life has partnered with another non-profit for a ride. We had 48 cyclists participate!

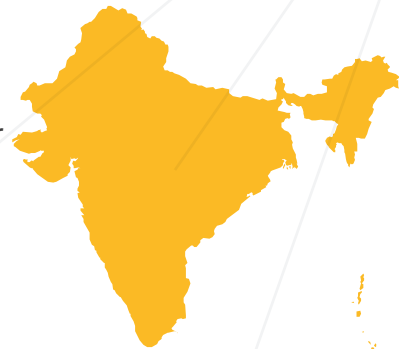
