SCHOOL OF PURPOSE POST-COVID UPDATE



OBJECTIVE OF THE SCHOOL OF PURPOSE

To equip pregnant teenage girls, teenage mothers and teenage girls at risk of sexual abuse with life and vocational skills to thrive.

ACTIVITIES

Community visits:

- 32 girls visited during lockdown. Nine (9) not visited because they are currently in the village.

Life-skills Training

- 20 girls received life skills and employability training through our partnership with [Wezesha Impact](#).
- 9 girls at the Princess Shelter have been engaged in crafts making. One community girl inclusive for now.

Spiritual nurturing

All the 9 girls at the Shelter receive spiritual nurturing sessions daily with the House Mother and while 25 girls in the community are reached via tele-conference call.

SPIRITUAL NURTURING HIGHLIGHTS

- 19 girls have accepted Christ as their personal Saviour since the year began;
- 32 girls in the community girls have been visited since the lockdown was lifted;
- 21 discipleship classes - 9 at the shelter and 12 on conference calls.
- 10 babies have been dedicated.
- 90% of the girls can read the Bible. The 10% who cannot read, listen to an audio Bible that was donated to us by Scripture Union Uganda.



WAY FOWARD

We intend to resume our hands-on skills training alongside the already ongoing spiritual nurturing sessions, lifeskills and employability training for all the girls beginning August.

With the lockdown lifted, and some bit of normalcy setting in, we are adopting a learning in shifts approach with other COVID19 precautionary measures in place.

The core courses that the girls will be engaged in are tailoring and knitting.
