The Food Bank of State College is a community-based organization. Our clients are the citizens of Centre County and our donors are also local community members. The volunteers for the Food Bank also span a range of individuals and groups. Many very young volunteer groups, such as Brownie Troops, serve by creating birthday bags for our client families. These

contain the three essential elements for a festive birthday - a cake mix, frosting and candles. They help to insure that our client's children's birthdays are special days. Boy Scout and Girl Scout Troops work together to bring tons of donations to local Food Banks. Middle School and High School students volunteer to pack bags for client distribution.

Penn State students help with major projects and volunteer on a regular basis at the Food Bank. Postal Carriers deliver tons of food for our local Food Banks every spring. We also work with individuals with special needs. Bob Wilson came to us from the Skills program. He has volunteered for two and a half years. He works in the mornings and helps to prepare the Food Bank to serve clients in the afternoon. He has been a reliable and Skillful addition to our volunteer staff.

Voter Registration at the Food Bank

This fall both the League of Women Voters and high school Student Carrie Peters set up a table to register voters and provide information concerning local, state and presidential candidates. Carrie describes her experience in her own words:

When my senior year at the State College Area Delta Program began this past September, a seed that my father had planted earlier germinated in my mind: Organizing a voter registration drive. Over the summer, I had become very involved with current events, and wanted to do my part in the

upcoming election, which I felt would be of utmost importance. A chance meeting with Pat Coble of the Food Bank sealed the deal – although I had not thought of the Food Bank as a location before.

I was, nevertheless, eager to begin. From mid-September through midOctober I set up a voter registration table outside of the Food Bank

office. First I encouraged and assisted patrons to register and, after the registration deadline, continued to provide information concerning presidential and other candidates. It was fun. I gained a true appreciation for not only the election
