## New Insights, New Challenges

2007 has been a year of, let's call it, newness for the State College Food Bank. You are aware that we have transitioned to a new location. We have had the assistance of many businesses and community groups to enable and to fine tune our new space. The summer of 2007 also brought some new developments that have concerned the staff and board of directors greatly. These include a marked spike in client need and a dearth of food resources to meet that increase.

For example, for the five and one-half years that I have served the Food Bank we have always had an excess of a few food items. Part of the State College Food Bank's mission is to support the other food pantries in the Centre region. One item that we have been able to provide other pantries has always been beans. Beans are a nutritious and economical food source and so many people donate beans during our major food drives. For the first time, however, there are no beans at our Centre Sorting Center. We have experienced other first time shortages and are struggling more than ever to keep up with the need for food assistance in our Centre region.

Both Director Linda and I have a peculiar kind of service job in that the best news would be that we no longer have a job because our clients are sustenance sufficient and no children are hungry. When the Food Bank began in 1982, many thought it would be but a temporary fix for a fleeting problem. The need for assistance has persisted and waxed rather than waned. Thanks to the generous donations of concerned groups and individuals in our Centre region, we are struggling but succeeding to fill that void — that very real visceral void of hunger.

#### New Challenges

Since I began in 2002, this year has been the toughest, bringing shortages of food like never before. From our major food drives we always received an over-abundance of certain items. By the time the next major drive was nearing, we would have many shelves full of tomato

products and beans. This summer they were all used up. These unexpected needs put pressure on our purchasing power at the time that our State Food Purchase dollars are expended. (We need to spend our allocation by June and sometimes do not receive the new fiscal year's funds until October.) So we struggled like never before to provide food to our client families. This shortage was not due to a decrease in donations, but due to a spike in cli-

ent needs. Many people think that families need more help in winter due to fuel costs and seasonal employment fluctuations. But many of our families with children need more help in the summer when the school breakfast and lunch programs are unavailable or curtailed. Our local regular donors such as our faithful congregations

ping Plaza (owned and operated by the University Park Plaza Corporation), next to the Mobil Service Station. Our mailing address, P.O. As the new Executive Director, I want to relay my heartfelt thanks to St Andrew's, the Food Bank staff, members of the board, our volunteers, our donors, and a special thank you to those who helped us move from one location to another. And, now that we have "settled into our new home," it is hard to believe that it is only a few days until Thanksgiving as I write this.

This year, the pace of life for us here at the Food Bank picked up earlier than usual for the holidays, and we expect to see it persist throughout the coming months. The high cost of gasoline, and elevated heating expenses continue to magnify the added adversity our low-income clients face at this time of year. Increased gasoline costs are also being reflected in higher prices for food. Consequently, the case managers helping these individuals and families are increasingly turning to our Food Bank as a means of finding additional resources to help meet their escalating expenses.

That's what we're here for, but we could never do it without your help! Also, we would be seriously over budget for food without the generosity of our donors who helped us once again by sharing their free turkeys or turkey coupons. We also know we will refill our shelves with food as many conduct food drives or simply donate extra food to us during the holiday season.

It is only through your many kindnesses and unfailing support that the Food Bank is able to achieve overall success in accomplishing our mission. The dedication of the State College community allows the Food Bank to care for area families and we take great pride in the services we provide. You have helped us through a year of many challenges, including a 4% statewide budget cut in our State Food Purchasing Program while reaching a record number of highs in regard to our local families' increased need to use our Food Bank during the summer months. I am thankful for all of you who joined us at the Food Bank to be able to hold up our part of the "safety net" of a caring community.

I wish each and every one of you a meaningful holiday season.

kept donations trickling in, but it was never enough to keep up with the numbers of clients. We used our gift cards extensively to purchase what we needed from local grocery stores. Ironically, with the Scouting for Food Drive and so many other food drives that occur around the holidays, we now have more food than we can deal with! But we are not complaining. Dealing with the excess is far better than facing empty cupboards. Thanks

to all our donors. We hope that some groups can move their drives to summer months when we need it most.

After relocating to our new site, we had our clients fill out a questionnaire to help us determine how to serve them better. Many clients, especially the working poor, requested Saturday hours and we are now open to serve clients on Saturday mornings. We also discov-

ered that there were some items that we were over-providing, including jelly and canned fruit which is one of our more

expensive items. One of our longterm volunteers, Mary Jane Brune, helped us to develop a new bag packing strategy. Our new method still provides a generous and diverse distribution to our clients, but it also streamlines our service procedure and cuts costs.

### New Home Improvements

Our new facility held many advantages but needed some

es, but needed some maintenance and a face lift. Two groups especially helped us to improve our site. For his Eagle Scout project Mark Kennedy organized a group of volunteers to paint the building and build some new shelving for our new

space. Thirty some volunteers scraped the old paint, primed and painted the façade and porch. They made the place much more appealing where the paint was once peeling!

The United Way's Day of Caring provided skillful help from Penn State's Applied Research Lab employees and many veteran Marines (and spouses too). They installed a

plate for our back door, wrapped our pipes with insulation, painted, and repaired the decayed overhang. Thanks to all!
