LAMBDA CHAPTER HISTORY

The 1950 Rebirth of West Wing

This school year marks the 70th anniversary of the rebuilding of Old Kenyon, which was completely destroyed by fire on the morning of February 27th, 1949. At least nine students perished and scores were injured in the blaze.

The painstaking rebuilding process began almost immediately. From an account in the Kenyon Bulletin: "Detailed photographs were taken of the walls and then keyed to the undamaged stones, which were numbered for eventual replacement in their prefire positions in order to match the original building as closely as possible. The walls were then torn down, a new basement was excavated, and a steel-andconcrete superstructure was installed. After that, the old stones were meticulously reset to mimic the veneer on the outer walls of the original building. Amazingly, the "new" Old Kenyon was ready for occupancy when students arrived for the 1950-51 academic year on September 11, 1950."

During the Lambda Lodge Renovation a few years ago, a booklet, ostensibly a newsletter for the Alumni from the then-



Actives, was discovered. Signed by Brother Beta **Robert Hall '50** from "Barracks 3" (apparently make-shift housing after the fire), it is a fascinating look back on the aftermath of the fire...and how Lambda then, as now, persevered.

Those that fondly remember the hours spent in the lower level of West Wing will enjoy this description of how the new design was coming together:

"One room, to be hereafter known as the Beck Room in honor of **William Beck '84**... will be a man's room. Done mainly in a rathskeller style, it will be paneled with husky, built-in benches. The tables will be oaken things on which you can feel free to play your last ace with the gusto it deserves or maybe even rest a beer mug. Brother Beck once said that he wants one day to be able to sit in the basement of West Wing and drink a beer in a room worthy of serious beer drinking. This will be that room.

"The other room will be like a really fine living room in a comfortable home. Oak paneled walls and an oak floor will set it off from other parlors on

campus. Comfortable and sensible furniture, a large fireplace, colorful appointments and carpets, two fully paneled walls, and twin French doors opening onto a southern terrace will make this room a room of which Lambda Dekes from '84 to '54 can be justifiably proud. There will be no equal room on the Hill."

Fascinating that they designed a fireplace into a building that had just burned because of a flaw in a fireplace. But, it was, indeed, a room like no other.

"We applaud the business and civic contributions made by James Norris Gamble (Lambda-Kenyon College). Brother Gamble was the son of James Gamble, the founding partner in Proctor & Gamble. Brother Gamble is credited with laying the foundations for the most successful product of Proctor & Gamble – Ivory Soap. As a chemist at the Company, Brother Gamble developed the formula for a mild, white bar of soap called "P&G White Soap".

It is said that an accident brought about remarkable change to his formula as another employee left one of the soapmaking machines running too long, which allowed too much air into the process. As a result, the finished batch of soap floated. Brother Gamble also served as the Mayor of Westwood, Ohio and as a member of the Board of Parks Commission of Cincinnati.

When Proctor & Gamble became a public company in 1890, Brother Gamble was named Vice President of the Company and sat on its Board of Directors. Brother Gamble retired from the Company in 1912 to concentrate on his other interests which included involvement in Cincinnati politics, religious groups, and charitable organizations including donations that he made to the YMCA and the University of Cincinnati. Brother Gamble was instrumental in forming the Christ Hospital Institute of Medical Research in Cincinnati."

Looking back on your time in DKE, what moments do you tend to remember most?

"There are so many memorable things that happened during those years... This is the one I remember the most with great fondness. I am sure I will take it - and the gratitude I feel for my brothers - to the grave. I had been studying in the library (admittedly a rarity in those days) and came back to the West Wing of Old Kenyon to find my brothers covered with grass stains and mud, watching television,



drinking beer, and 'celebrating.' This in and of itself was not all that unusual except that such 'celebration' generally did not occur so soon after a 'tough' weekend near the beginning of the week.

I assumed that there had been some type of impromptu football game on the quad, only to discover that there had been a rumble between DKE and another unnamed fraternity. That group had been chanting in front of the Wing: 'all the fraternities are white and free, save the brothers of DKE,' to which the brothers present took exception. Though not at all happy about the chanting, I gained a greater appreciation for my brothers and felt a greater kinship because of something that happened in my absence.



I enjoy connecting and reconnecting with the brothers of DKE. I even had the opportunity to connect with a younger brother who inquired about my experience being the only African American in my class and in the chapter during my tenure. I also enjoy the comments I receive on social media.
