It was a productive and friendly meeting during which the college expressed support for the return of DKE to campus. Then and Now: A Look Back With Jim Pierce '78

We had the pleasure of hearing from **Jim Pierce '78** recently. He tells us about life since DKE, a career as an insurance broker, moving to Texas, becoming a grandfather, and much more!

Tell us briefly about your life since graduation - career, family, hobbies,?

I started work on Wall Street right after I graduated and have never changed careers. I think that makes it year 43 as an insurance broker!

My career has focused largely on helping energy companies protect their balance sheets and income statements through the purchase of specialized, individually negotiated insurance placements. My interest in energy took me to Texas in 1981, and I have called Texas home ever since.

Over the decades, I married and have four children, one of whom is now married. During COVID, my daughter Clemmie had her first child, a grandson named Pierce. He is 18 months old and a joy to be around.

From a hobby standpoint, I played squash for about 35 years, but my knees told me it was time to put the racquet away. My sport of choice now is golf, and I play as much as I can. I am a member of the United States Senior Golf Association, so I am able to play at wonderful venues around the country.

What was it about your time at DKE that inspires you to continue to give back?

My Kenyon memories are lasting ones and revolve around sports and DKE. On the DKE front, lifelong friendships were formed. I remain convinced that people who do not experience fraternity life miss some of what four years of college has to offer.

To this day, 25 of us communicate (at least once a day) via email. That kind of bond does not exist outside Greek life. I was pledgemaster my senior year and thoroughly enjoyed the role. Many of my pledges are friends today. I detest the attacks on Greek life that are so prevalent in the woke world of the academe. These assaults on Greek life take isolated examples of bad behavior and tarnish the entire system; a system steeped in history and philanthropic integrity. I try to do my small part to keep the tradition alive.



How have you stayed in touch and kept involved with DKE over the years - attend events, attend reunions, etc.?

I am in touch daily with many brothers, mostly through the email chain referenced. I haven't attended reunions per se, but will say that three years ago, when Lambda was arbitrarily and capriciously given a four year death sentence, about 20 of us flew to Kenyon to plead the DKE case. We did, ultimately, succeed in reducing the suspension to two years, but getting things back to some semblance of normal has been a slog, and we still have some distance to travel.

What would you say to other alumni who may be considering donating, but have not done so yet?

Remember your time at Kenyon and how much of it was DKE related. It is too easy to fall back into a comfort zone and say "that was a long time ago...not my issue anymore." Well, it is our issue, and complacency is a scourge! Every Lambda DKE should dig deep and help the cause.

Were there life lessons you learned at DKE, and if so, can you recall instances where those lessons helped you?

It may sound old fashioned, but playing varsity sports and being a member of DKE gave me

four solid years of being part of a team, whether on the field or off. There is no better way to learn how to succeed than to learn the importance of being there for other people.

Which brothers do you keep in touch with, maybe see on a regular basis?

The list is too long, but includes, **Sam Adams, Mark Robinson, Howard Sutherland, Doug Holmes, AJ House, Joe Hagin...**there are many more.

Fraternities can sometimes get a bad rap these days, but why do you believe they're still an important part of the college experience?

There are recent studies showing that males are increasingly struggling to find meaning while attending university. These attacks on Greek life (based on wild innuendo and highlighting the few miscreant acts of a distinct minority of members) are leaving a huge hole in campus lives; one that won't be filled without that sense of belonging that comes with a fraternity.

Can you share a few of your favorite memories of your time on campus?

Well, sports were a big part of my four years, but as regards to DKE, other than forming lifelong friendships, it was definitely hell week. Now, to be sure, what we experienced no longer exists, and I have no doubt that some of the things I did would land me in trouble today! But the fact is that no one got hurt, and we all experienced bonding memories that we still laugh about today. I think it is a shame that some of the traditions have been discarded or banned by those who think they know better.

One final, random, question - do you have any famous relatives in politics?

As far as politics, my father was Barbara Bush's older brother, so George H.W. Bush (41) was my uncle and George W. Bush (43) is my first cousin. I have immense respect for 43 and enjoy my occasional visits with him. The fact that he has become a latter day Churchill and achieved a status as a pretty darn good painter makes him even that much more interesting!

After Three Years and Endless Dedication to Lambda Chapter, Biff Butler '68 Steps Down as Alumni Association President

It was the first week in October 2015 when Lambda DKE Alumni gathered on campus for their Annual Meeting (back when such a thing was allowed). We were halfway through our fundraising campaign for Lodge improvements and **Biff Butler '68** was elected Board Chair for what he thought would be a one-year term...two at the outside.

Of course, during his second year (and preparing to step down at the 2017 Annual Meeting and turning the reigns over to Vice Chair **Sam Baker '13**), the College sanctioned the Active Chapter for violations related to "endangering behavior, hazing, and dishonesty." As we look back today, we now know that the Chapter had been "set up" by parties unknown, as its registered Pledge event was far from the reported "scene of the crime." But the College was undeterred and put the Active Chapter on probation.

Biff quietly emerged himself into the process, meeting with countless College officials to lift the sanctions. To be sure, he had assistance from several Brothers through the ensuing three months...but it was Biff who drove to Gambier from Louisville several times during that dark period to negotiate with College officials.

During that time, he negotiated a DKE Internship Fund designed to assist Actives with summer internship costs through the College Foundation. As relations were still tenuous with some members of the

Administration, it was agreed that Biff should stay on for a third term to preserve continuity of leadership.

Then, in the Spring of 2018, our world was turned upside down when an anonymous letter to the College accused the Actives of forcing members to be "branded." College officials were apoplectic, despite celebrating the Kenyon Swim Team getting brands in the Alumni Bulletin years before. And again, the charge was untrue. Juniors and Seniors could elect to be branded...but no one was ever forced or coerced. Once again, Biff was on

campus, attempting to inject sanity into the process.

As we all know, the sanctions from that charge were finally lifted in the Fall of the COVID-year of 2020. Throughout it all, Biff Butler was our leader in working with the Administration to keep Lambda viable. To be sure, he was assisted mightily by **Jim Irwin '69** and **Doug Lanpher** from DKE HQ and a host of other Brothers. But, as **Sam Adams '81** recently said, Biff was our Virgil, guiding us through the seven layers of the Inferno.

And, as the Active Chapter has scored Pledges in the latest Rush (more on that in next month's e-newsletter...which you can subscribe to on our www.LambdaDKE.com website), Biff has turned the page on a 6-year odyssey in which he led us all through the Valley of Death. At the virtual Annual Meeting in October, Biff stepped down from the President's post and Sam Adams was elected President.

It is with great sadness that we learned of the passing of several brothers into the Mystic Circle. We want to extend our deepest sympathies to their families, friends, and loved ones.

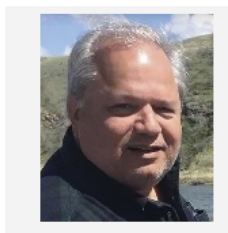


Jeffrey Scott Taylor '78

For 26 years, the Actives of Lambda staged the annual Shawn Kelly Memorial Holiday Party for disadvantaged youth in Knox County. The event is in memory of **Shawn Kelly**, a DKE and award-winning swimmer at the college who passed away in 1990.

Despite it being an exceptionally heartwarming and generous event that benefited over 400 Knox County families in need, due to sanctions the past few years, the Actives were prevented from hosting the Holiday Party. Past events included a spaghetti dinner and holiday craft making for the kids (such as creating snowflakes and reindeer-food). And, of course a visit from Santa.

And, the Jolly old St. Nick (who, rumor has it, is a Lambda Alumni) would never disappoint, as every child went home with a present purchased with donations from students, faculty, staff and alumni. Powered by



good old fashioned face-to-face fundraising, the Chapter had just gone digital with their ask, setting up an online GoFundMe page that allowed alumni and other off campus individuals to contribute, helping to push the total raised in 2016 to over \$3,000. What money remained after the Brothers bought the presents was then gifted to the Head Start organization.

We are excited to report that the Actives are bringing the Shawn Kelly holiday event back this December. With the help of Theta Delta Phi, the event is scheduled for December 2nd and 3rd. Unlike past years in which the event was staged in Gund Hall, the Actives planned a COVID-era outdoor event with food to go, a synthetic ice skating rink, Santa and some other activities.
