John told us that if our hearts condemn us, God—who is living in our spirits—is greater than our hearts (see 1 John 3:20). So, what is the condition of your heart?

Are you exalting your heart and its beliefs to the point that you're sensitive to yourself but insensitive to the Holy Spirit? Does your voice reign supreme in your heart when it comes to the issues of life? Do you take hold of your problems according to your perspective rather than God's?

If you're walking in anxiety, that means there is an issue to be resolved in your heart. We have to turn to Jesus. It's time for us to take our eyes off ourselves and to look unto Jesus, the pioneer and the perfecter of our faith:

...looking unto Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith, who for the joy that was set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and has sat down at the right hand of the throne of God. (Heb. 12:2, NKJV)

The word *"looking"* here, in the Greek language, carries the meaning of stopping what we have been looking at and turning to look in a new direction. In this context, it implies that we are looking away from ourselves and putting all of our focus on Jesus.

When you focus on Jesus in this way, you are not going to waver between two opinions (see James 1:6-8).

Being double minded (James 1:8) means that you have two different belief systems. When you waver, you are trying to trust God but are still focused on the problem. In order to resolve the issue of anxiety, you do not deny you have a problem, but you refuse to accept the anxiety associated with it.

With God, you have nothing to be anxious about. You'll say, "No way! I want my heart to be free from anxiety, so I can hear God's voice. I can do what He says and get His results. His Word can open up to me. I can be sensitive to the Holy Spirit. So, I cast all anxiety on Him and don't exalt the problem." You don't deny there is a problem. No! You want to be able to look at the problem without it dominating your heart.

You want to be so free on the inside that you have more confidence in Jesus than you do in yourself. You won't have to be in control, because something has been proven to your heart. You've experienced God at work in your life.

Understanding How God Works

I remember a lady coming to me for prayer. She began to speak, and the tone of her voice and the choice of her words revealed the condition of her heart.

There was a whine in her words as she said, "Oh! It's been so hard!" She continued to tell me, in detail, about all the issues, including expressions of hurt and pain.

All this revealed how she believed in her heart. She believed Jesus had let her down. You see, she thought that she was believing when she prayed, but her prayer wasn't answered. So, just like a lawyer, she took God to court. In her heart, she said, "I did this, Lord, but You didn't respond."

This is typical of those who are under the weight of their issues. Their hearts have been dominated by their problems so much that they have become the problem. They don't just *have* a problem; they *are* the problem. God is never the problem. If there is a problem receiving, it is always because of our lack of understanding His way of life in Christ. God has established all things through His Son, Jesus Christ. We receive from God because of the covenant He made with His Son.

When you draw up a covenant or a contract to sell your home, it may include a clause that states the number of days you can stay before you have to move out. The covenant sets the terms, so if the buyer shows up before your time in the house expires, you'll be able to point to the clause in the contract and say to them, "You can't do that. It's in the contract."

God works through covenants, but He didn't make a covenant directly with us. God made a covenant with Christ Jesus. If God were to make a covenant with us, our flesh is so weak that we would fail. We would blow any covenant, probably worse than the first Adam did. So, God made a covenant with His Son, and it is incredibly important to understand all that God accomplished through that covenant. For example, we enter into relationship with God through Jesus Christ because He fulfilled the terms of the covenant perfectly. Jesus was the perfect sacrifice, so we can have a relationship with God through Him.

The way you initially receive salvation, in and through Him, is the way you are going to continue to receive everything. "As therefore you received Christ Jesus, the Lord, walk in him"

(Col. 2:6, WEB). The way it happened in the beginning is the way it continues. So, salvation is about Jesus, and healing is about Jesus.

Receiving in Christ Jesus

Do you understand how to approach God in Christ Jesus?

Do you understand what it means to receive in Christ?

Paul told us that all the promises of God, every single one of them, are always "Yes" and "Amen" (see 2 Cor. 1:20). The promises were given in Christ Jesus. Therefore, we need to understand what it means to receive in Him.

Remember, the covenant was made with Jesus. It was not made directly with us. We enter into relationship with God through Jesus, and we continue to receive every promise through Jesus.

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As we understand the difference between receiving from man and receiving from God, we will see that, in Christ, we're already free—now! We'll come to understand that we have this freedom in every area of life, including our relationships, our finances, and our health.

In healing, when it comes to living the truth of Matthew 8:17, we need the help of the Holy Spirit for God's perspective. The Holy Spirit will show us how to apply the truth of the cross to our lives.

I'm reminded of a lady who had an open vision of Jesus on the cross. She didn't like what she saw. She didn't enjoy the experience of watching Jesus suffer. It was terrible. In fact, her heart was not changed by the vision. An open vision is a form of communication from God. He has a purpose for it, and you need to understand that purpose and to see the meaning of the truth He is conveying to you.

Sometimes, but not always, people get open visions because God's Word isn't opening up to them. That was the case with this lady. In her situation, she was not connecting to the truth of God's Word. She was living with a serious, potentially life-threatening physical problem. The Lord was trying to reach her heart with understanding. He gave her a visual presentation of Christ suffering on the cross, to make salvation and healing very real to her heart. Instead, although she could tell you everything she saw and how terrible it was, her heart did not change. This shows us that even a vision from God will not change us if our hearts are hardened and sensitive only to ourselves and our problems.

When God gives an open vision, we still need the Holy Spirit. Understanding is not about our intellect trying to figure things out. No! Our hearts need to be humble before the Lord so that the truth comes alive on the inside.

When we think of all that Jesus went through and the price He paid in His love for us, our hearts should soften every time. When we fully understand the cross and all that Jesus accomplished for us there, our hearts should just melt on the inside. There should be humility of heart when we put our thoughts upon Jesus. It will be an influence upon our hearts for good instead of a hardness, where we just callously brush His suffering aside. There will be such a sensitivity toward Him; it will be very beneficial for our hearts to open up to Jesus.


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The Danger of the Intellect Dominating Our Hearts
