## THE FIGHT FOR LOWER KLAMATH

You wouldn't know it from this photo, but the Lower Klamath **I** National Wildlife Refuge was once the Pacific Flyway's Grand Central Station – a year-round hub of waterfowl activity.

Tens of thousands of ducks raised broods here each spring and summer. Even more – particularly mallards that breed in the Central Valley - chose this vast wetland as their safe haven during their annual molt, which leaves them flightless for up to 60 days.

Hundreds of thousands of migrants that breed and molt up north, including pintail, used this as their staging area on their journeys south each fall, and back north each spring.

Those numbers, though, are cratering as Lower Klamath's water supply is strangled, increasingly diverted down the Klamath River or held in Upper Klamath Lake to try to help three fish species in danger of extinction - so far in vain.

It's a staggering tragedy nearly 20 years in the making, and now approaching a dangerous tipping point as generation after generation of waterfowl arrive here to find no water when they desperately need it. The cost can be measured in dead ducklings, a shrinking state mallard breeding population, intensified botulism outbreaks - 2020's is the worst anyone can remember - and diminished body condition for birds that do survive.

#### Saving Lower Klamath is CWA's top priority.

The problem is exceedingly complicated, tied up in matters of water rights, the Endangered Species Act and, in years like this, poor rainfall. But with the support of our passionate members, our allies in the Klamath Basin (flightless) Breeding & farming community and a new raising broods high-powered Lower Klamath Refuge Task Force, we can Historic (1960s-90s) build on a series of smaller victories to solve

## 'SKIN IN THE GAME'

"In the past, I've always thought of hunting as something to be discouraged at any opportunity; I had viewed it as the ruthless killing of an innocent creature."

"I grew up with family friends that were just as passionate about conservation as they were about hunting, but (I) always felt that they were hypocritical."

"I (used to see) hunting as antithetical to conservation, understanding it only to be diminishing wild populations for recreation."

Tf you heard those words coming out of **⊥**the mouth of the manager of your favorite wildlife area, you'd be concerned, and with good reason.

While the non-hunting general public often doesn't understand what drives hunters, we expect more of our wildlife professionals: They should be aware of the value of a constituency with a deep vested interest in maintaining abundant habitat for wildlife.

The words above were written by people who could become wildlife managers: UC

Davis Wildlife, Fish & Conservation Biology students, two of them featured in photos on the left. In duck blinds, with guns, and ducks they shot.

So how do they get from Point A to Point B?

It starts with professors who are hunters and know that hunting is critically important to conservation: Raveling Waterfowl Chair Dr. John Eadie and Dr.

Bob McLandress, the former president of California Waterfowl. Over a decade ago, Eadie saw a growing problem: Students who might become wildlife managers were no longer coming from hunting backgrounds, and they often lacked any meaningful connection to wildlife.

Inspired by the work of a Wisconsin professor, Eadie dreamed of creating a camp that would introduce his students to hunters and hunting, not necessarily to make them lifelong hunters, but to ensure they had a better understanding of a key conservation constituency.

He found ready partners in hunter-philanthropist Paul R. Bonderson, Jr., whose Bird Haven Ranch was the perfect venue for such a camp, and in CWA, which already had a strong youth hunter education program. College Camp was born.

With the completion of the 2020 camp, 157 UC Davis students have now participated, many of them going on to careers where their insights serve them well.

Georgia Ramos, whose stellar shooting at College Camp was featured in a 2010 You-

> Tube video by former CWA board member Jay Goble, was transformed by the camp.

> "It was a life-changing experience that expanded my knowledge and comfort zones far beyond my expectations. It was a good reminder to set my mind in sand (instead of stone) so I always have room to change my perspectives," she said.

Alisha Seabert, who

shared a blind with CWA board Vice Chair Rik Jimerson in the 2020 camp, was equally transformed. "I have been completely won over by everyone's passion and love for the hunt," she said. "You'd better believe I will be out duck hunting next year."

Eadie has a saying he shares with his students now: Mud on the boots. Blood on the hands. Skin in the game. "We won't sustain what we don't care for, he said. "We won't care unless we obtain value from it. And we can't value what we don't know and haven't experienced."

#### **UC DAVIS COLLEGE CAMP**

Hosted by Paul and Sandi Bonderson at Bird Haven Ranch, operated by California Waterfowl's expert hunting education staff.

Camp includes hunter ed, shooting instruction, tours that highlight the Bondersons' conservation efforts and a Sunday hunt.

Wildlife professionals whose career paths students may follow — biologists, wardens, refuge managers — guide the hunts.

Up to 15 students participate each year, now totalling 157 over 12 camps to date.

Unfortunately, California's breeding population of mallards has declined due to insufficient breeding habitat. CWA is working on many fronts to address this:

**WATER FOR LOWER KLAMATH:** We're fighting to get water back to a national wild-life refuge that provides critical breeding, brood-rearing and molting habitat – see recent successes and our big goals on page 3.

**ADDING BREEDING HABITAT:** About 3,300 acres of brood ponds are being added in the Central Valley under the Presley Program. CWA fought to get \$10 million for the program in Proposition 68, allowing it to enroll its first new acreage in 15 years.

In addition, our regional biologists always endeavor to include breeding habitat projects in the restoration work they do each spring and summer. Their efforts added 247 acres of breeding/brood-rearing habitat in 2019.

**GIVE THEM TIME TO HATCH:** Mallards love nesting in winter wheat, but sometimes harvesters come before nests can hatch.

Delaying harvest helps, but it can also increase fire risk and degrade the product. So with the help of our generous supporters, California Waterfowl pioneered a Delayed Wheat Harvest Incentive Program in 2020, compensating farmers to delay their harvest on 1,645 acres. Farmer interest exceeded available funds by more than 4 to 1, so we are seeking additional funding to continue and expand the program.

**HABITAT FUNDING:** CWA sponsored a bill to fund the state's new Nesting Bird Habitat Incentive Program, but it did not pass, a casualty of a legislative session shortened by COVID-19. We'll try again next year.

## SERIOUS DEDICATION

rganizing a California Waterfowl fundraising banquet is a ton of work: It involves months of planning, securing donations, working with the venue and caterer, hustling to secure sponsors and sell event tickets, and making the actual event run as smoothly as possible.

So when Tech Sgt. Josh Dallas learned the Air Force was deploying him to South Korea right when his America's Freedom Fight-

ers Banquet was scheduled to be held in Lincoln, this dinner committee chair did something crazy: He moved up the event date by one month, which took a big bite out of preparation time.

And here's the kicker: In addition to having less time to plan, he and his wife Johanna - the dinner co-chair - would now be doing the bulk of that work during duck season.

He could have just put it off until he returned home in 2021. But this dinner directly supports something really important to him: CWA's Veteran Hunt Program.

An avid duck hunter himself – his entire family hunts - his goal is to help CWA get as many active-duty military and veterans out duck hunting as possible.

"Whether it's their first time or 100th, I want them to have the opportunity to go places that they normally wouldn't be able to go," he said this spring in an email from Osan Air Force Base. "I know active duty members have a hard time trying to get in a club or finding good spots. They have to move every couple years, or deploy throughout the year."

Josh and Johanna took on this annual dinner seven years ago, when the Veteran Hunt Program was just one year old. The program has gone from taking 40 vets on hunting and fishing trips in its first year to more than 500 in 2019-20, thanks in no small part to the dedication of the Dallases.

"The dinners do take work," Johanna said. "The months coming up to it, I worry. Will there be enough people? Can we raise

> enough money? But we're helping bring people outdoors, so after every dinner and deployment, we always say, 'Man, that was worth it."

> Josh, who is crew chief on a U2 Dragon Lady reconnaissance jet in the 9th Reconnaissance Wing, does more than organize this dinner. He volunteers in CWA's California Wood Duck Program. He is the volunteer game warden at Beale Air Force Base. And he and Johanna help with many dinners in the Greater Sacramento area.

Dan Haugh, CWA's field operations representative for this banquet, said Josh is a true hero.

"He's been in the Air Force more than 15 years, has been sent to many places all over the world,

and has had to endure and see some things that 99% of the population would never know anything about. Yet, the guy is just always, well, for the most part, happy. He loves his wife and kids more than anything. He's a downright positive person.

"Josh is truly a great dude," Haugh said. "He will literally do anything he can at any time to help someone else out. That is rare these days, but that's Josh."

At its best, Lobby Day is about sharing stories of the marsh coming to life, the thrill of hard-earned success and the reward when we do everything right: duck for dinner!

When non-waterfowlers hear those stothey see hunters are not caricatures, and they can see why our passion is a powerful force for good.

"It was so encouraging to get face time with our representatives and share with them what lights us up about the outdoors," said 2019 Lobby Day participant Shannon Drake, an avid hunter who got her start with CWA's Becoming an Outdoors-Woman. "To answer their questions honestly and feel their attitudes shift in such a short period, I actually feel like I made a difference in our government."

She and the other 20 who participated

in 2019 did make a difference: The authentic stories of ordinary people have heft that paid lobbyists' words can't match.

"We can't emphasize enough the value of Lobby Day," said CWA Vice President for Legislative Affairs & Public Policy Mark Hennelly.

"Legislators hearing directly from CWA members who are impacted by their votes

is one of the most important educational tools we have."

Participant Andre Fontenot loved meeting fellow waterfowlers and hearing about their passions. But, he said, "what I enjoyed most about the day was meeting the CWA employees who work hard behind the scenes for us."





**CHUCK RAFFETY** 

What caused that rather dramatic shift? It turns out everyone has their own way of supporting their chosen causes, and Raffety – who owned and operated Carson Valley Electric in Nevada – chose to give through his estate.

The big question for him was, "To whom?" He talked about it extensively with friends like Joe Paper and Eric Paris, who encouraged him to think about where his passions lay.

Well, duck hunting, obviously. But for Raffety, it was especially the need to pass hunting on to future generations. He loved the annual CWA-sponsored youth hunt at the Salinas Club. And he loved seeing that CWA spends its supporters' money right here in California, Paris said.

There was his answer, Paper told him. "California Waterfowl is doing what *you* want to do with your money," he said.

When Raffety passed away in 2018, CWA was floored to learn the extent of his generosity: He left a \$1 million gift, which was transferred to CWA in 2020. Its impact will ripple through our work for decades.
