ood ducks have come a long way. Though they were sliding toward extinction due to habitat loss once upon a time, this unique species' population has had an amazing comeback, thanks to conservation efforts such as CWA's California Wood Duck Program. Enthusiastic volunteers of the program build and monitor nest boxes as a substitute to compensate for the loss of natural tree cavities, which wood ducks naturally nest in.

Compared to the previous year, in 2023 CWA saw an increase in the numbers of enrolled nest boxes and volunteers, as well as a 16% increase in the numbers of ducklings hatched. With nearly an additional 26,000 ducklings hatched in the past year from the California Wood Duck Program's boxes since the program's inception in 1991, that brings our total number of ducklings closer than ever to the long-awaited milestone of 1 million. In fact, we anticipate hitting our goal sometime this upcoming nesting season. Great job, wood duckers!

2023 BELLROSE AWARD RECIPIENT

The California Wood Duck Program is pleased to announce Caroline Brady as the winner of the 2023 Bellrose Award. As a current environmental scientist of the California Department of Fish and Wildlife's waterfowl unit, as well as CWA's former waterfowl biologist, California Wood Duck Program coordinator and waterfowl programs supervisor, there's no denying that Brady has shown untiring commitment to making sure our state's duck populations thrive.

Brady banded thousands of nesting wood duck hens for the Wood Duck Program as a permit holder and collaborated with project and district

managers, volunteers and staff all over the state to keep projects running smoothly. Her meticulous record keeping and data management were crucial for helping CWA keep track of wood ducks' nest box use and reproductive success.

Over the years, Brady also successfully recruited new

Through events like Wood Duck 101, Yolo Duck Days and the Wood Duck Program dinner, Brady raised funds for ducks and taught the public about how to run a productive wood duck project. Countless event participants received firsthand instruction from her on how to assemble and put up boxes, catch hens, band ducks, examine eggs/nests and record data.

As just one more example, she previously led a group of 40 university students, many of whom were non-hunters, on a tour of wood duck nest boxes at Rancho Esquon to teach them about the Wood Duck Program, the role nest boxes play in helping

the species' population, and how hunters give back to the environment. By the end of the tour, on top of learning about waterfowl and wildlife conservation, several students who had originally viewed hunting in a negative light experienced a change of heart.

A devotion to **WOOD DUCKS**

he first time Harlan Albers ever laid eyes on a wood duck was when his brother shot and brought home a drake. The two of them and their father all chipped in money to get the handsome bird mounted, and Albers decided to read up on the species out of curiosity. That's how he learned about the California Wood Duck Program from a CWA magazine. He thought it looked interesting and decided to join, and the rest is history.

Albers started out with just six nest boxes in 1997, with 31 ducklings hatched during the first year. Today, his

previously worked in construction, receives donations of plywood and builds all his boxes himself. He assembles them with care and jazzes them up with Spanish moss, and when he finds any fallen trees with nice knotholes that are the right size for nest cavities, he incorporates those, too. He happily drives two hours each way to his project site and braves steep slopes, poison oak, muddy conditions and blackberry thorns to diligently monitor his wood duck boxes.

While Albers loves being involved with the Wood Duck Program, it can come with a variety of other struggles. Heavy rain often poses problems, for instance. Despite the majority of his nest boxes being erected on metal poles to try to deter predators, floods will knock down boxes every now and then, sweeping them away to never be found again, or ruin the wood with water and mud. Sometimes other creatures like owls, flickers, wasps, kestrels or bees from a nearby apiary beat the wood ducks to the boxes. Sometimes hens abandon nests, too, so whenever Albers encounters abandoned eggs, he rescues them, candles every single one and hands all the viable ones over to CWA. Last year he brought just under 1,000 eggs to Egg Salvage Program Coordinator Jason Coslovich to take to a hatchery.

And from time to time, working on the project means dealing with some heartbreak. Just last year, Albers was excited to have snapped a photo of a hen with dimples on her cheek, alongside a drake. After appropriately dubbing her "Dimples," he patiently waited with high hopes to catch her using a nest box. Two weeks after, he caught her with 21 eggs. Later, when he returned to check on her around the time the eggs were supposed to hatch, he found Dimples in the box — headless. "Ringtail cats," Albers suspected. On other occasions, he finds ducks killed by other predators like raccoons or river otters.

But although not every moment is a happy one, a lot of them are. There's the time when Albers witnessed an astounding 41 ducklings hatch from a single box, cared for by a 6-year-old hen. Another time, he had the pleasure of watching a delinquent duckling try to leap from its box while the disapproving hen repeatedly blocked the hole with her wing. (Eventually the duckling managed to slip out anyway, after multiple failed attempts.)

Albers also delights in seeing the regular visitors. Ever since receiving his sub-banding permit in 2001, he has banded 900 hens. He typically bands between 40-55 hens a year and recaptures about the same number of his previously banded hens, though once in a while he also captures one banded by someone else. One of the oldest hens Albers ever encountered was a hen he recaptured for 10 straight years, and which had had over 200 ducklings during her lifetime. "Catching and banding hens is an up-close look and bond with the hen. You get attached to them," he said.

Why is he so fond of wood ducks in particular? Albers says he enjoys their beauty. "They're fun to watch roost in trees. They're unique and active," he remarked. He also likes listening to the ducks vocalize, especially the calls hens make to each other and their ducklings. His goal is to eventually create a documentary about all the vocalizations. And after all the hardships ducklings endure in nature, Albers says he likes to see them succeed, grow up and fly.

Albers has spent thousands of hours watching the wood ducks from his project and enjoys capturing their activity with his camera. (In fact, his photos have shown up in quite a few wood duck reports over the years, including this one.) Using the photography blinds that he's set up around the creek, he waits patiently inside, sometimes for up to five hours, to try and capture the moment that ducklings jump from the boxes. It's always an adventure. Once, he even had a hen land directly on his camera lens. "I do see other species such as songbirds, waterbirds, quail, hawks, raccoons, beavers and otters, and have even photographed illegal dumping along the creek," Albers said. "You never know what you're going to see when you are tucked in a concealed blind."

When asked about what he would say to someone who's on the fence about volunteering with the California Wood Duck Program, Albers replied, "It's a lot of work, but it's well worth the effort once you get into it. It makes you feel so good. If you're thinking about doing it, do it because you're going to get more enjoyment out of it than you think you will."

"Part of the whole wood duck nest box experience, "he said, "is working with the landowners who allow the use of their property to install nest boxes and hearing the feedback they give you about how they enjoy seeing more wood ducks around than ever before."

Besides mentioning that it's a good way to give back, especially for people who are hunters, Albers added, "It makes you think about what the ducks do growing up. It's so rewarding to be out. You get out into nature; you see deer, raccoons, river otters, all the different waterbirds along the creek. It's just fun."
