Our Watershed

Situated within one of the most-densely populated regions of Canada, the Credit River Watershed contains some of the most diverse landscapes in southern Ontario. In this area, the Carolinian Forest zone meets the Deciduous Forest zone, both of which contain unique species not found in other zones.

The Niagara Escarpment and the Oak Ridges Moraine also run through the water- shed, further increasing the number and diversity of plants, animals and communities. The Credit River is almost 90 kilometres long and meanders south-east from its headwaters in Orangeville, Erin and Mono, through nine municipalities, eventually draining into Lake Ontario at Port Credit, Mississauga.

The Credit River is home to a wide range of wildlife including 244 bird species, 64 fish species, 41 species of mammals, five species of turtles, eight kinds of snakes, 17 amphibians (frogs, toads, salamanders and newts) and 1,330 plant species. The Credit River is the most diverse cold-water fishery in Ontario, if not eastern North America.



As we work to further our mission we are reminded of the rich history and enduring presence of Indigenous peoples as stewards of the land and water of the Credit River Watershed.

We acknowledge that the Credit River Watershed is part of the treaty lands of the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation. The Credit River Watershed is also the traditional territory of the Huron-Wendat, Haudenosaunee, Métis and, most recently, the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation.

As citizens, we continue to be party to the treaties made with Indigenous peoples. We affirm that this land and water are our common source of life and we must all share in their stewardship and prosperity, now and for future generations.

Credit Valley Trail Land Securement

2019 Contribution \$488,249

Once in lifetime, a property becomes available that is essential for Credit Valley Conservation to connect communities along the Credit River. Thanks to our generous donor community, CVC was able to acquire a spectacular 44-acre property in the heart of Caledon, along the upper reaches of the Credit River.

Referred to as our "Capstone", the property is the inaugural land securement for the Credit Valley Trail and the missing piece of the puzzle, enabling public access to Charles Sauriol Conservation Area.

The property includes critical Brook Trout habitat, the watershed's most important native fish species.

Partially forested with the Credit River meandering through, the property includes stunning cedar forests and rich biodiversity – a true natural jewel that is now protected forever.



CVC and its partners are creating a continuous 100 kilometre trail along the banks of the Credit River, from Orangeville to Port Credit. Acquiring the Capstone property secures 650 metres the trail route and connects a continuous 8.5 kilometre stretch of trail.

Conservation Youth Corps

2019 Contribution **\$156,128**

Thanks to the support of our generous donors, 3,052 youth from our watershed communities took part in CVC's youth volunteer programs in 2019. The program engages and inspires young residents through hands-on environmental stewardship experience and connects them with their local natural environment. Activities include tree planting, building and maintaining trails, building bird boxes, creating habitat structures, invasive species removal and stream restoration.

The program has been fostering youth environmental awareness since 2006 and now offers three streams. The CYC summer program, where students can earn volunteer hours while participating in week-long work terms in conservation. The Branch Out program enhances the high school science and geography curriculum, and raises awareness about climate change. Frontline helps high school students to stay involved through training, workshops and job-shadowing, inspiring youth to be the next generation of environmental leaders.



Deon Singh participated in the CYC summer program in 2017. Like so many, it sparked a passion for the natural world. He felt inspired to join the Frontline program where he acts as an ambassador in his community, encouraging others to take environmental

action. His dedication to the environment was recently recognized with a Lieutenant Governor's Award and Young Heritage Leader scholarship. **Congratulations Deon!**

Island Lake Natural Playground

2019 Contribution **\$160,000**

Thanks to generous support from Friends of Island Lake, Orangeville Lions Club and Rotary Club of Orangeville, construction is nearing completion for the natural playground at Island Lake Conservation Area. The innovative playground is designed to help connect children to the local natural environment, encourage physical outdoor play and to deepen community cohesion by enhancing quality of life for residents and visitors.

The 1.17 acre nature-inspired playground will incorporate natural elements like plants, water, logs, boulders and terrain, with built-in play structures to provide different sensory experiences and diverse play opportunities. It will provide an opportunity for kids to engage in unstructured playtime that encourages discovery. The playground will also feature a fully accessible loop trail with nature-themed play pods, that will connect into the existing Island Lake trail system. In winter months, the 2.5-metre-wide playground trail will offer skating and skiing, for all ages to enjoy.

The new playground incorporates Indigenous design elements that will showcase local cultural heritage, and was developed in consultation with our local Indigenous community partners, the Credit River Métis Council.



Each year, CVC engages our incredible community and corporate partners, true leaders in conservation, in meaningful tree planting and restoration work. It's a wonderful team building exercise, all for a great cause, while signalling a strong commitment to the local environment.

In 2019, we engaged 2,125 corporate and community participants through 39 events. Together, they planted 7,372 native trees and shrubs, and restored 37,821 m² of land. New for 2019, we assessed 68 past tree planting sites with a handful of dedicated volunteers, checking to see if seedlings were thriving or in need of assistance. This ensures accountability to our funders for their investment in the local environment.





Nature-based Stormwater Solutions

2019 Contribution \$184,349

Our communities are confronted by the challenges of growth, climate change and aging infrastructure. Innovative ways to manager stormwater, such as nature-based solutions, have proven to be cost-effective, sustainable and support public health, the economy and the environment.

Thanks to our generous supporters, CVC is piloting a community-based approach to stormwater management in Mississauga's Southdown area, focusing on infrastructure that rests solely on private lands.

Working outside of municipally-owned infrastructure presents opportunities to bring neighbouring landowners

together to solve persistent problems with localized flooding. If successful in the long run, the approach can revolutionize stormwater management, creating a more decentralized system with low impact development features that mimic nature, with less reliance on traditional stormwater infrastructure.

This means better flood control and more resilient communities in the face of extreme weather brought on by climate change.

Low Impact Development Training

CVC has long been recognized as a leader in low impact development - an approach to stormwater management that captures rainwater water where it falls and filters it into the ground. Partnering with like-minded conservation authorities through the Sustainable Technologies Evaluation Program (STEP), CVC continues to revolutionize research, guidelines and training related to urban water issues.

As our climate continues to change, the frequency of extreme weather events increases. Low impact development techniques make our communities more resilient and able to withstand flooding and extreme weather. Thanks to our generous supporters, CVC was able to expand its low impact development training, offering additional opportunities to share knowledge, expertise and guidance with a greater number of industry professionals.

In addition to in-class training, new training modules and tools were made available online and on demand, increasing the potential to reach a broader audience throughout the Province of Ontario. CVC trained 979 individuals in-class, 605 online and reached 11,933 through online video tutorials.

2019 was a fabulous year for our Conservation Gala. Together, 368 guests raised over \$293,000 in support of the Credit Valley Trail, Conservation Youth Corps and land securement. Held at Lionhead Golf Club and Conference Centre in Brampton, the gala kicked-off with a cocktail reception and live Birds of Prey experience, followed by an exquisite three-course dinner. Layne the Auctionista brought the fun and loosened the purse strings during the live auction and fund-a-need "philanthro-tainment". Guests showed their support through the silent auction featuring 118 unique items and experiences.

Since 2006, the Conservation Gala has raised over \$2.2 million in support of CVC projects and initiatives that enhance the local environment for present and future generations. Each year corporate leaders, individual donors and municipal representatives attend the Conservation Gala.

Island Lake Trail Donation Day

The Friends of Island Lake (FOIL) hosted their annual Trail Donation Day in support of our natural playground project, which will help connect kids with nature, inspire unstructured play and encourage outdoor exploring. FOIL volunteers collected donations from trail users.

Since 2005, FOIL has worked with us to help raise more than \$2.6 million in donations to complete accessible trails and new infrastructure at Island Lake Conservation Area. The number of people using the park has exploded since July 2015 when the final bridges, generously supported by FOIL, were installed on the Vicki Barron Lakeside Trail. The bridges created a full trail loop around Island Lake. Last year more than 220,000 people visited the park.
