ABOUT THE CREDIT RIVER WATERSHED


The Credit River Watershed contains some of the most diverse landscapes in southern Ontario. The Niagara Escarpment World Biosphere Reserve, the Oak Ridges Moraine and the Greenbelt all bisect the watershed.

The Credit River is 90 km long and meanders southeast from its headwaters in Orangeville and Mono, through nine municipalities, finally draining into Lake Ontario at Port Credit in Mississauga. Nearly 1,500 km of streams and creeks empty into the Credit River along this route including: Black Creek, Silver Creek, Shaw's Creek, Fletcher's Creek, Caledon Creek and the East and West Credit Rivers.

The river's headwaters are located above the Niagara Escarpment, a World Biosphere Reserve, and are the source of four rivers; the Credit, Humber, Etobicoke and Nottawasaga.

The Credit River is home to a wide range of wildlife including 244 species of birds, 64 fish species, 41 species of mammals, five species of turtles, eight kinds of snakes, 17 amphibians (frogs, toads, salamanders and newts) and 1,330 species of plants.

Home to 45 different species of fish, the Credit River is the most diverse cold-water fishery in Ontario, if not eastern North America.





CONSERVATION

YOUTH CORPS

For the past ten years, Credit Valley Conservation has been engaging high school students from across the watershed in an award-winning youth environmental training program called Conservation Youth Corps (CYC). CYC provides local youth with unparalleled opportunities to participate in hands-on environmental stewardship activities, learn STEM-related technical job skills, and grow into champions of conservation.

There are 3 components to the CYC program:

- The CYC Summer Program provides opportunities for students to earn 35 volunteer hours while participating in weeklong work terms in conservation.
- ➤ The Branch Out! program enhances secondary science and geography curriculum and raises awareness about local climate change issues.
- Frontline is a CYC student leadership program that provides training, workshops, and jobshadowing opportunities for youth.

2016 marked the 10th Anniversary of the CYC youth volunteer program!


CREDIT VALLEY

TRAIL

Following the path of the Credit River from the headwaters in Orangeville to the mouth of the Credit River at Lake Ontario in Port Credit, the Credit Valley Trail (CVT) will stretch approximately 98-km, promoting a deeper understanding of the indigenous history of our watershed; highlighting the watersheds natural environment; and promoting cultural heritage features.

More than just limestone screenings and directional signs, the trail will serve as a green gym, a destination in a tourism strategy, a history lesson, access to nature's art gallery, an active transportation corridor and perhaps most important — a community builder for the Credit River and the watershed.

The Credit Valley Trail is a legacy project that has been explored by Credit Valley Conservation for over 60 years. Belfountain CA




The guiding Credit Valley Trail strategy is being developed with indigenous partners, watershed municipalities, stakeholders and residents to identify an ideal route and to define short and long term actions. The CVT Strategy document will be published in 2017.

COMMUNITY TREE PLANTING

CVC'S tree planting programs help to restore and improve our watershed by:

- Increasing forest cover
- Helping to reduce greenhouse gasses and fight climate change;
- Improving the quality of the natural environment
- Attracting more wildlife and increasing wildlife habitat
- Improving water quality in your streams and ponds
- ➤ Protecting groundwater supplies
- Improving your outdoor recreational activities
- Increasing residential property values and adding variety to landscapes

In 2016, 2343 community and corporate planting volunteers contributed 6103 hours and planted 8741 native trees and shrubs.





STREAMBANK

RESTORATION

Upper Credit Conservation Area

Student volunteers from the Conservation Youth Corps Program worked with CVC and Trout Unlimited to narrow the width of the stream and re-establish shoreline vegetation, achieving these objectives:

- 650m of stream will be augmented using natural materials in July and August
- 750 trees and shrubs will be planted along the shoreline in July and August
- 8 habitat structures will be installed in July and August
- 375 beaver guards built in June and installed in July and August
- 450m of stream will be monitored for stream morphology in August
- ➤ 65m of stream will be monitored for fish populations in August

The Upper Credit Conservation Area contributes to the longest distance of publicly owned lands along the Credit River.

This unique area is made up of over 12 acres of provincially significant wetlands and is part of the Alton Wetland Complex.

The reach of the Credit River through Upper
Credit Conservation Area has been identified as a
critical cold-water fish community hosting 10
species of fish including Brook Trout.



GRASSLAND BIRD

RECOVERY PROGRAM

Birds are an important part of biodiversity in the Credit River watershed. Through their songs, movement and visual presence, birds connect us to nature. Sadly, according to many researchers, species of grassland birds are at risk of becoming extinct both in the Credit River Watershed and within Canada.

The Credit River Grassland Bird Recovery Program is dedicated to the protection of habitat for provincially at-risk species such as the Bobolink and Eastern Meadowlark.

Our watershed is home to four Grassland birds designated as "Species at Risk", meaning that they are in danger of extinction or of disappearing from Canada.

More than 90% of grassland bird populations declined in eastern North America between 1966 and 1989 - a rate higher than any other type of wildlife in North America



LAKE ONTARIO

FLYWAY PROGRAM

The Lake Ontario shoreline is an important pit stop for the travelling birds along two major routes — the Atlantic and Mississippi flyways. These are the flight paths that thousands of birds take as they travel the long distances between their winter homes in south and central America and summer homes in the north.

In Mississauga, the birds must stop to rest and refuel after making the trek from the south and the long journey over the lake.

The shore is not always as hospitable as it could be for migrating birds. Challenges include a lack of native plants for food and shelter and threats from domestic pets, plate glass windows and nighttime lights that interfere with navigation.

The protection of migratory birds through *Lake Ontario Flyway* program includes the creation of 4 hectares of bird habitat along the fully developed Lake Ontario shoreline.

Conservation Area Fundraising Groups

In 2016 the Friends of Island Lake continued to support improvements to the Island Lake Conservation Area trails, such as ensuring it exceeds the requirements of the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act, and raising funds to build accessible fishing piers.

Planning for future trail amenities got underway and fundraising events such as the 8th Island Lake Bass Derby and Trail Donation Days were highlights of the year.






